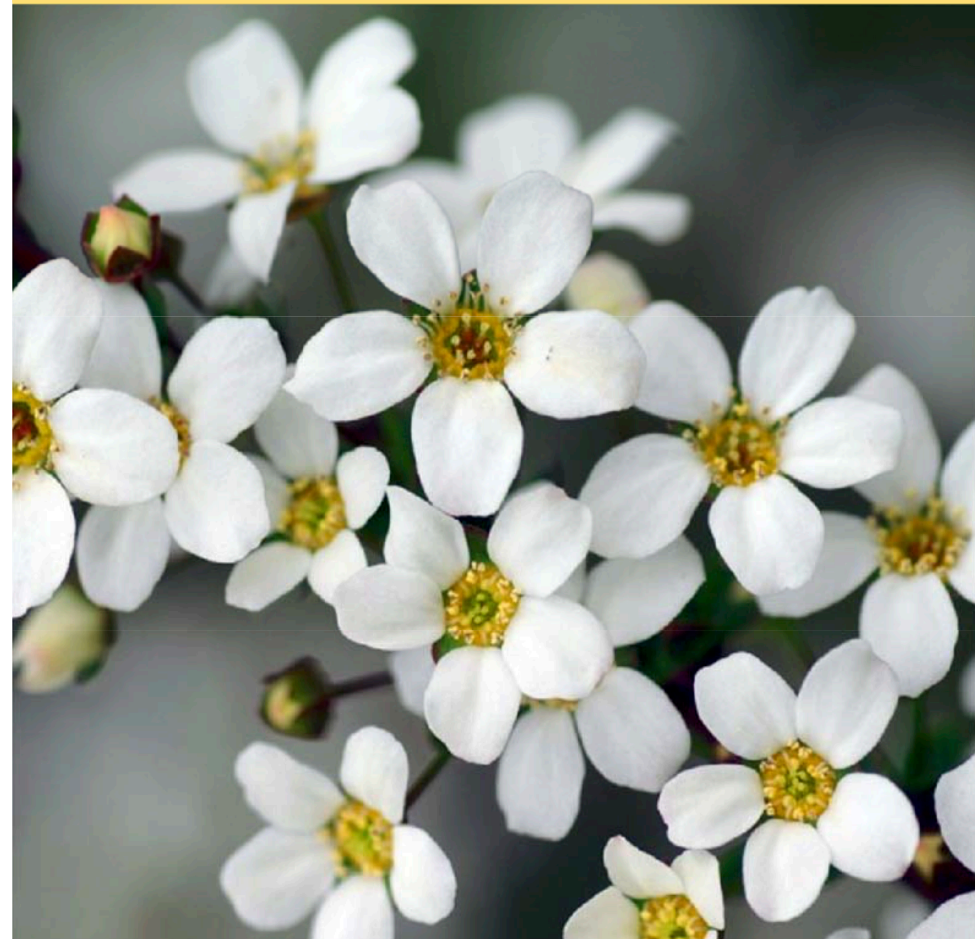

The Promise of Our Faith

Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Nothing – not tragedies, suffering, sickness or even death – can tear us from God’s embrace. This central truth is the foundation of our Christian faith and the good news of the Gospel.

What is also true is that all of us will die. Scripture tells us we are dust, and to dust we shall return. Even though talking about death can be uncomfortable, it is important for us to communicate our final wishes to our loved ones. Talking about end of life issues, making decisions, and planning our memorial or funeral service can be true acts of love.

As Christians we believe that the power of resurrection is greater than the power of death; that Jesus, by his death gives us life, and by his resurrection gives us hope. And so each memorial service or funeral service is a Witness to the Resurrection. As we gather for these services, we proclaim that death does not have the final word: life does, love does, God does. Because we are Easter people, we live in the hope of resurrection, new life, and God’s eternal love. In life and in death, we belong to God. This is the promise given to us through faith in Jesus Christ.

Grief Support

Every grief is unique because every individual is unique. Death can come suddenly and tragically or it can come as a friend, bringing release from pain and suffering. In every case, death leaves a void. It is important to remember that while life will never be the same again, life can be good again. People do not “get over” grief, but they can learn to live with it and work through it.

Remember that you do not have to be alone in your grief. Find people who will listen, offer comfort, prayers and other kinds of support. Do not hesitate to contact the church pastoral staff for support at 609-896-1212.

What is Heaven Like?

We have a relationship with God now that continues beyond the grave. Our true home is with God. We call that home heaven. We have only the contours of what life with God will look like, but Scripture tells us to expect rest from all of the burdens and limitations of earthly life, and life abundant in fellowship with God and the “great cloud of witnesses” that have gone before us. This understanding of death does not erase the sadness of losing someone we love, but it allows us to grieve with hope in God, who will never let us go.

There are many images and metaphors that the New Testament uses to describe life with God. These glimpses of life beyond death bring comfort. Jesus told his followers that he was preparing a place for them “in my Father’s house”:

In my Father’s house there are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and take you to myself, that where I am, there you will be also. (John 14:2-3)

When Death Occurs

The church should be notified as soon as a death occurs. Our pastors can offer comfort to family, support with difficult decisions, and help with arranging for final services.

Planning a Service

The pastors and staff of the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville are available to help you plan a service to celebrate the life of your loved one and to proclaim the promises of our faith. It is vital to contact the church prior to setting a time for the service. The church's schedule and the personal schedules of the pastoral staff and organist must be considered when planning the time and place of the service.

Pre-planning a service can lessen last minute decisions and ensure that final wishes are respected. The Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville can assist you and your family by keeping a record of your requests on file.

THE SERVICE OF WITNESS TO THE RESURRECTION

The Service of Witness to the Resurrection is a service of worship, designed to glorify God and comfort the living, and is conducted with dignity and simplicity. One of the pastoral staff normally conducts the service. Close family members, friends, or guest clergy may participate at the invitation of the pastor. Guest musicians and soloists may participate in cooperation with the church organist. Fraternal, civic, or military rites should be conducted at a time and place other than the funeral or memorial service. Once the details of the service have been determined, the church office will prepare a bulletin.

FLOWERS

Because the funeral or memorial service is a service of worship, the Meetinghouse or the Chapel should appear much as it would on any given Sunday. Dignity and simplicity suggest that arrangements not be lavish or numerous. It is the responsibility of the family to dispose of the flowers following the service if they do not remain for a Sunday service. It may be helpful to have the funeral home personnel assist with moving flower arrangements.

RECEPTIONS FOLLOWING THE SERVICE

Receptions can be held in the Fellowship Center or in the church Lounge following the service. The church office can help with scheduling the space and facilitating arrangements. Food and beverages are the responsibility of the family.

MEMORIAL GIFTS

Frequently families request that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the church or to other charities. This information should be included in the obituary. Memorial gifts may be directed to the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville Memorial Fund. Acknowledgements will be sent to the family and to the donor of the gift. GUEST BOOKS

Guest books and pens are provided by the family and should be placed at the church one hour prior to the service.

Service Considerations

ACCESSIBILITY

The church Meetinghouse can be entered from the north parking lot through the double glass doors. The first room on the right of this entrance, the Lounge, is available for families to gather and receive guests prior to the service. Non-family guests usually enter the Meetinghouse through the church entrance facing Main Street (Route 206). Chapel guests may use the main chapel entrance facing Main Street, or they may enter the Chapel from the inside using the steps leading to the church office. Designated handicapped parking spaces are available in the north parking lot.

CASKET

If a casket is brought to the church, it will be closed at all times. Funeral home staff will be responsible for assisting the pallbearers in placing and removing the casket. Funeral home staff must remain on the premises when a casket is in the church building.

DISPOSITION OF THE BODY

Burial, cremation or donation of the body for medical research are all appropriate options within the Christian tradition. The body or ashes may be interred prior to the service or following it. If the body has been donated to science, a memorial service may be held immediately, with an interment at a later date.

MEMORIAL GARDEN

The Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville has a lovely memorial garden on the north side of the church. A central feature of the garden is an obelisk carrying the names of church members and their loved ones. Arrangements to add a name to the obelisk may be made by contacting the church office at 609-896-1212.

The Meetinghouse seats approximately 200 comfortably on the ground floor; the chapel seating capacity is approximately 60. Please notify the church office if handicap access is needed for those who plan to attend the service.

TWO TYPES OF SERVICES

Funerals traditionally include a closed casket in the worship space during the service, which is then taken directly from the church to the cemetery for burial. In a memorial service, there is no casket present because the burial has already taken place, the body of the deceased has been donated to science, or the deceased has been cremated (an urn may or may not be present for the service). Burial can precede or follow any memorial service.

SCHEDULING: Funerals or memorial services are conducted by our clergy or pastoral care staff and may be held at the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville or off-site. Before a date and time can be confirmed, the family must have a conversation with the minister who will be officiating. He or she will set up a time to finalize the plans for the service, which will typically include a printed bulletin. If the family wishes to have music for the service, the church office will handle securing our church organist. If our organist is unavailable, another qualified organist will be provided.

VISITATION PRIOR AND/OR RECEPTION AFTER THE SERVICE

If the family desires to have a time for visitation at the Church prior to the service or a reception following it, they will need to make arrangements with the minister in charge or the Church Office Manager. Because there is no food service provided by the church, the family is encouraged to engage a caterer or other help.

PAYMENTS (MEMBERS)

There is no charge for a funeral or memorial service for members. However there is an organist fee of \$200*, and an honorarium (gift) may be offered to the minister or staff member. Checks for the organist (and minister/staff member) should be made out directly to them.

For a non-member service, the fee schedule is as follows:

Organist - \$300*

Custodian - \$125

Minister/Staff Member - \$300

Use of sanctuary (Meetinghouse) –\$600

Use of Chapel - \$300

Use of Fellowship Center for Reception (optional) – \$200

Checks for the minister/staff member and the organist should be made out directly to them. Checks for the custodian and the use of the building should be made out to The Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville and earmarked accordingly.

*Organist fee on holidays may be higher.

FLORISTS

Florists making deliveries should call the church office to insure access.
